

The Elections Board has unanimously found Jared Hunter in violation of Article III, Section 2, Subsection F, Letter a, Paragraph viii of the SGA Elections Manual for the use of "Jared Hunter for SGA President" in the subject line of an email correspondence asking organizations to speak during campaign period.

Because of the circumstances, the board has found no malicious intent in the use of the specific subject line and found Jared Hunter in minor violation with the sanction of: Warning

The Elections Board unanimously voted that Lillian Roth was not in violation of Article III, Section 2, Subsection e, Paragraph vii of the SGA Elections Manual for:

- A Crimson White publication of an article stating her intent to run for re-election
- Correspondence with the student body/organizations informing them of SGA initiatives through her role as SGA President.

Because she personally was not quoted and did not give a statement, and her right and responsibility to continue her role as current SGA President; no sanctions have been brought against Roth regarding this issue.

Note: Roth proactively communicated with the Elections Board, given the unique circumstance, inquiring about whether she could issue a response statement and the Elections Board advised her not to.

The Elections Board unanimously voted that Lillian Roth was not in violation of Article III, Section 2, Letter E of the SGA Elections Manual for throwing the first pitch of the baseball game as current SGA President

Being asked to throw the first pitch or hand out awards at Alabama Athletic events is a typical request of any SGA president and Roth does not violate any rules by completing the throw as current SGA president.

The Elections Board unanimously voted that Lillian Roth was not in violation of using her personal Instagram as an official campaign page. Her new handle reflects her current position as SGA president and the board has advised Roth to update her bio to reflect her current position.

All candidates are required to make a new official campaign page when campaigning for a new position or term. While candidates are allowed to post on their personal pages to reflect the actions happening in their every day lives, the board encourages candidates to have all personal posts and messages point toward the new candidate page and have all official campaign posts on the page.

Example: If a candidate is announcing on their personal page that they are running, that is fine. If they are to post anything else regarding platforms, events, etc, they should be posted on a official campaign page as to allow voters to "opt-in" to receive information from candidates.
